Staff Updates

We've conducted interview for our vacant Clubs and Events Coordinator position. After a first round of interviewing 6 applicants from a total of 182 applications, the hiring committee, comprised of the SCSU President, VP Operations and Executive Director, was inclined to repost due to a mismatch between the applicants and the requirements of the job. The new posting closed on June 19, 2014.

We've filled a couple of part time vacancies including the Minute Taker position with Amal Mohamed Mehad and our P/T Graphic Designer's position with Dianne Ruaya. Both positions are contract position that will last until April 2015.

Vice President External Hiring

We've conducted interview for the vacant Vice President External position during June 12th, 2014. There we're a total of four applications and all four were called in for interviews. A hiring committee was formed comprising of the SCSU President, VP Operations, VP Equity, VP Academics & University Affairs, VP Campus Life and Director of English. A call was sent out to the Board of Directors asking for a Director to sit on the hiring committee and only one submission was received.

The hiring committee selected a candidate that had a history of strong leadership, community involvement and event planning experience. The hiring committee recommends that the Board of Directors ratifies Anika Ahmed for the position. She will serve in the role until the vacancy is filled by an elected individual during our Fall General Elections per our by-laws.

Volunteer Network Program (VNP) Update

After some reorganization, the VNP will be a part of the Vice President External's portfolio instead of the Clubs and Events Coordinator. This will allow the VNP Coordinator to benefit from the extensive network that the Vice President External has and their level of connectedness with community groups. During transitional periods the position will report to the SCSU President. We have posted the job on our website. The last day to apply is June 24, 2014.

SCSU Restaurants Incorporated (SRI) Update

The SCSU Restaurants Incorporated is a wholly owned subsidiary of the Scarborough Campus Students Union that owns KFC Express, HERO Certified Burgers and Rex's Den. A reorganization that occurred in April of 2014 saw the role of the SRI General Manager divided into two: Rex's Den Manager and SRI Retail Manager - KFC and HERO. We've began the interview process for the SRI Retail Manager role and hope to have the candidate start by early July. The Rex's Den manager role will be filled by our current Assistant Manager until the end of August where a performance review will determine the next steps.

SCSU Profit and Loss Statement (April & May)

Each Board of Directors meeting, the SCSU will begin presenting monthly profit and loss statements to show revenues and expenses that have been incurred in the preceding month(s). Below are a few notes about our operation over the months of April and May. The income statements are attached in Appendix 3.

- We've upgraded our accounting system at a cost of \$900 for four licenses including two for our recently hired Accounts Payable and Accounts Receivable Associates
- In the month of April, the SCSU provided \$8,677.49 in funding to Clubs' and DSA's
- Wages and benefits to all employees of the SCSU totaled \$120,417
- General Liability Insurance was purchased for the SCSU at a cost of \$9,636
- The SCSU had a one-time expense of \$47,524 to pay an invoice for 2011 Agenda books

New Services - Update

Zip Car will be coming to UTSC! After a follow up with Zip Car Toronto and University of Toronto Campus Safety and Security, Zip Car has submitted a proposed contract with the tentative closing date being August. We will be working closely with all parties to promote the launch.

Associates - Update

The SCSU Executives have hired the first associates for the year! The Vice President Equity Associate posting closed June 11th, 2014 and three applicants were interviewed out of a total of five. Mitra Fakhrashrafi has been hired on an honorarium based contract lasting until April of 2015. The rest of the executives have stated that they would like their associate to begin in the fall semester. Associate positions will be posted on www.scsu.ca/jobs in late August.

Board of Directors Retreat - Update

We have set a date and time for the board retreat to be July 18, 19, and 20. Please make yourselves available for these dates. Similar to previous years, the retreat will be held at Kempenfelt Conference Centre in Barrie, Ontario. If you have any questions please do not hesitate to ask.

Postering Update

We have completed a revamp of our poster boards. We have created boards that will have designations for ex. External postings and internal postings. This will allow us to better direct students to the different services, events and opportunities available for UTSC students. We have also made an effort to clean up the boards to

make the a little more appealing so people stop and stare, and also signage to indicate the purpose of the boards.

Campaigns & Advocacy

Shuttle Bus Update

After much deliberation UTSC is getting a shuttle bus to and from Kennedy station running from the hours of 7:30am to 11:30pm, Monday to Friday, still waiting to hear back word about weekend service. It is an express shuttle that will have 2 stops, one at the Pan Am Centre and the other being at the bus loop. This is a service that has no cost associated with it, and will be fully operated by the ttc. In terms of time, this shuttle bus service will allow students to get from St. George campus to UTSC in about 45 minutes, give or take some traffic. Due to the contract the city of Toronto has to ttc, this was the best option given the different variables at play and the influence of the surveys. This new bus will have its own designated waiting area at Kennedy station, and will be dubbed "The Blue Rocket." The ttc will also be implementing ticker boards and bus arrival signage throughout various areas of the campus for peoples very needed awareness.

Bridge Feasibility Project.

As we move towards the 2030 UTSC Master Plan, one of the projects on the docket is a bridge on the west side of military trail on Ellesmere to divert traffic away from the dangerous intersection. The proposed bridge is a foot bridge and its primary purpose would be for the UTSC community commuting throughout the campus. As we expand it may be safer to move away from the deathly intersection that is Ellesmere and Military trail. We are working with the university to make sure the bridge is accessible, efficient and feasible project for UTSC. If you have any questions about this bridge, please direct them to Tahsin.

National Aboriginal Day - June 21, 2014

National Aboriginal Day is on June 21! Sabrine is working closely with Indigenous students on campus and DSL to bring UTSC students to the 7th Annual South East Scarborough POW WOW on Tuesday, June 24, 2014. Free transportation to and from UTSC will be provided. SCSU has set up a Facebook event page and will have a booth at the event. All are encouraged to attend and promote this event. Meeting with The Underground

Tahsin and Sabrine met with Kosan, the Editor-in-Chief of The Underground. SCSU is excited to work with The Underground in making UTSC students aware of the inequities we face; from unfair lack of student space to systemic and institutional racism. SCSU and The Underground will be having regular monthly meetings to ensure constant communication. Indigenous Students Association Meeting

Attended a meeting in regards to the programming the ISA is planning or wanting to plan throughout the year. This executive team has shown a keen interest on creating awareness about the identities of indigenous

peoples, and what better way to do that than with the ISA, we hope to continue to work with them to create opportunities for education throughout the year.

Senior Administration Meeting

The SCSU executives as well as the UTSC executives got together and had our annual orientation meeting. This is the opportunity for the UTSC executives to discuss what they are working on in the scope of students, and the SCSU discuss the priorities of the union for the year. It was a great meeting and laid the foundation for future collaborations. Several issues were raised, some of them being campus safety, study space, transit, electronics in the classroom, and the overall 2030 master plan was presented. MSA Final Dinner

The SCSU was invited to attend the year end Final Dinner held by the Muslim Student's Association of UTSC. Tahsin Chowdhury and Sanoj Navan attended the final dinner held Thursday may 15th at 6pm in the Meeting place. There were a few speeches made by leading figures in the community and was followed by the dinner.

Student Life Meeting

The executive team met with the Director of Student Life – Liza Arnason, and Despon Pouyat – Dean of Student Affairs. It was a nice meet and greet where we discussed our priorities and places for collaboration.

Terry's Cause

This is annual run that is held by the athletics, SCSU shows support by offering resources, holds a seat on the planning committee. The event is to raise awareness about cancer and cancer fighting initiatives. This year some of the executives have decided to participate in the run. Any money donated to the cause goes directly to cancer research, we encourage you all to come out and attend the event and even run if you can, a date is yet to be finalized.

CFS Skills

In the weekend of 23-25th of May almost all staff and executives attended the skills symposium conducted by the Canadian federation of Students and hosted by York University. The skills symposium consisted of several workshops that were catered towards specific skills which included; organizing campaigns/events, finances, membership outreach, human resources, meeting facilitation and various other skills useful for student representatives. The workshops were very informative and very helpful for skills training and continuity of our student union. The executives brought back many positive things from this event and is a great initiative taken by CFS.

Student Societies Summit

Preamble

The Vice-President and Provost Office began hosting a Student Society Summit in August of last year. UTM and UTSG Societies were invited to participate; UTSC societies were left out of participation. The purpose of the Summit was to help resolve disputes that were occurring among a few Societies downtown and the UTSU. On April 14, 2014, The Vice-President and Provost Office released a Report with recommendations for Societies of

all three campuses. In order to be more inclusive, the Scarborough Campus Students' Union began holding our own Student Societies Summits to include societies that were not involved in consultations that formed the Report. The Report included recommendations that remove the right of Student Societies to function as autonomous bodies. Further information on the Summit and the Report may be found in the links and attachments that follow.

June 13 Meeting

Our third meeting was held. Several new folks from UTSC joined the discussion. We decided to take a step back from the report and discuss the broad issues our students are facing, and our responsibilities as student societies to address those needs.

Student Academic Handbook

On Tuesday, June 10, 2014, the VP Academics and University Affairs sat down with Annette Knott, the Academic Programs Officer, to follow-up on updates to the Student Academic Handbook. Content changes were discussed; the VP AUA is in the process of reviewing the draft. Some policy recommendations were identified and will be taken up with the Vice-Dean Undergraduate.

Meeting with Director of Campus Safety & Security

Nicole and Sabrine met with Gary Pitcher, the Director of Campus Safety & Security to review the annual police report. Due to the lack of student engagement of the walk safety program, we are in an ongoing process to implement a student-run safety program where students, not police, are the escorts. Meeting with Initiator of the MMMHM

Sabrine Azraq met with Karen Young, the Catalyst-in-Chief of the Minds Matter Mental Health Magazine (MMMHM), the first mental health magazine at UofT. Sabrine and Karen brainstormed means of collaborating in raising awareness of mental health and healthy living to UTSC students. Anyone and everyone interested in this on-going discussion is more than encouraged to contact Sabrine!

Study Space Working Group

The study space working group was held on Thursday, June 12. Updates: Library has implemented a new policy where 2 T-cards must be used to book group study space (to curb single studiers using the space). As for the multi-purpose space in the North campus (Instructional Centre) pushed for by the SCSU, a message was sent by the Muslim Students' Association outlining the necessity of the space. The working group noted that we will continue to utilize this space to accommodate for Finals this year.

Positive Space Committee

Sabrine went to the Positive Space Committee to discuss various initiatives happening on campus and in the community promoting positive space. The committee initiated the Positive Treats event at UTSC and is working on the Ally Project Exhibit which will take place at the end of March.

Meeting with Library

The VP Academics and University Affairs had a meeting with Elizabeth O'Brien, the Library Systems Coordinator on June 3. It was an introduction meeting to share ideas for the year, and to get updates on new changes to the Library. Updates: "Research Guides" are an important service the Library would like to promote more this year. Each librarian specializes in one or several departments and is responsible in providing guidance to students completing assignments in those departments. "Digital Scholarship Unit" – purpose to create digital collections that integrate tools for research. This collection began in 2010 and continues to rapidly expand.

Pride

Sabrine is in constant dialogue with UTSU, UTMSU, SC:OUT, and members of the Positive Space Committee in the planning of UofT Pride initiatives. On June 20 there will be the UofT Pride Pub Pre-Event: Global LGBTQ Human Rights: IN Conversation. That same day will be the UofT Pride Pub at Hart House. There is also a UofT Pride Picnic that will take place on June 25. Lastly, UofT will have a float at the Pride Parade! All interested in planning, volunteering, or attending any/all of these events are encouraged to contact Sabrine!

Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions (BDS)

The president of the Ryerson Students' Union invited SCSU and numerous other student unions to a BDS Organizing Meeting to share any resources, strategies or tactics for the upcoming year. Sabrine and Kavita attended this meeting to discuss strategies for abiding by the BDS motion passed in 2013 that asked the SCSU to lobby UofT administration to divest from companies that support or profit from Israel's international law and human right violations. Anyone interested in this on-going discussion is more than encouraged to contact Sabrine.

CFS National Annual Meeting

Nicole, Sabrine, Kavita, and Amir attended the CFS National Annual Meeting on the occupied land of the Algonquian peoples, also known as Ottawa. We represented SCSU at this meeting by voting on a series of motions presented by various unions across the country. We also had the opportunity to connect with, and learn from student unions from all over Canada in a series of group discussions. Vandalism in Multi-Faith Prayer Rooms

Clay tablets used by the Muslim Shia community to pray have been destroyed and spread across the floor. Sabrine met with a member of Thaqalayn Muslim Association (TMA) who first brought up the concern. Tahsin and Sabrine then met with the president of TMA and discussed various means of stopping hate-based acts. We have posted 10 signs in the Multi-Faith Prayer Rooms that condemn the destruction and/or theft of property.

We will also be meeting with faith-based groups who actively use the prayer space to collectively condemn these actions. For more information, please contact Sabrine.

Events & Programming

Orientation Updates.

We have finalized the theme of orientation and also finalized graphics and marketing material for promotion. Preliminary promotions have already been launched on social media. The orientation website is updated and will be open for registration by Friday 21st of June. Full promotional material will also be up by this date. Promotional material includes social media posters/banners, t-shirts/lanyard/bag graphics and a mail-out package that is to be mailed out to all potential first years. The schedule has been drafted and is attached to this board package as appendix 1 as well as the orientation budget as appendix 2. Please note that the schedule is not final and minor changes are expected to be made as we continue to coordinate with the other departments involved.

We have had several meetings with the various committees involved in orientation. In the past weeks we met with all campus departments to discuss their involvement and role in SCSU orientation. This meeting was steered to connect with other UTSC departments planning orientation activities and to work in collaboration with the different programming involved in their respective departments. We also have weekly meetings with the orientation planning committee which includes DSL and SCSU, in order to plan the details in the orientation timeline. These meetings are steered towards updates in the micro details of planning, scheduling and logistics of orientation. The last planning committee meeting was dedicated to allocating space for all orientation activates and booking these spaces. We also had our first meeting with the Parade committee, which is the main body involved in planning the parade that happens downtown on 5th of September. There parade will start off at the Varsity stadium this year for the first time and the meeting was steered toward discussing these changes and logistical aspects of the changes.

There has been some progress in the human resource aspect, as we've completed all Senior Leader (SL) training and delegated respective tasks and responsibilities in terms of orientation programming. We have also started getting back to all Group Leader (GL) applicants and have planned all aspects of GL hiring and training. Currently, the posting has gone up for Logistical Leaders (LL).

After reviewing various quotes we have made decisions with regards to some external service providers involved in orientation. The decisions were made by comparing the rates and priority was given to providers previously involved with orientation. We have made our choices on A/V equipment, tables/chairs, performers and carnival/entertainment services. Internal decisions have been made and contracts are to be finalized after final review by the executive team.

50th Anniversary Planning

50th anniversary planning continues. The university has issued a legacy fund that will be a sum of 50K for students, faculty, and staff to apply towards sponsoring initiatives that will leave a mark or some sort of legacy at the university. The president of the SCSU sits on the board that will be looking at the proposals and help in guiding which initiatives are selected for the fund. The fund is broken up into different chunks. There will be one

UTSC academic orientation began Friday June 20th and is sporadically placed on days up until the 12th of July. During get started we discuss our services, campaigns, and events as well as promote orientation towards the first years at get started. Drafting a green policy in regards to printing and paper to take to Rick Halperns office, setting up one on one's with DSA's to see how we can help them, got an invite from Mark Shmuckler to sit on the calendar for the 2015-2016 student union, researching on the anti-calendar checking the feasibility of introducing this back in. Looking to change some items under the scsu dsa link. CFS and OXFAM are doing a joint event on Monday January 23rd, great opportunity to mingle with external organizations.
- d. President- 50th anniversary planning is still under way, the downtown campus of the university has given the students 50,000 dollars to spend in trying to create lasting impression on campus. The terms of reference for the fund are being discussed now, set up a meeting on Monday with executives to further discuss T.O.R. for this fund, on top of this there is another available fund of 50,000 for students and faculty alike to collaborate and again leave a lasting impression on campus. Shuttle bus update, we got a shuttle bus to and from kennedy station Monday to Friday from 7:30am-11:30pm back and forth every 10 minutes, starting in September, this is a free of charge service that we are bringing to the students. Attended a bridge feasibility project meeting to determine whether or not this bridge would walk, looked at several models to make it as accessible as possible. Get started is underway, executives have been scheduled to outreach during the days its occurring.

5. EXECUTIVE REPORTS

Services and Operations

Liu speaks on TCC metropasses and tokens, and states that through discounted Adult Metropasses, Post-Secondary Metropasses, and tokens, members have saved over \$150,000 in transit costs.

Liu speaks on charging stations within Student Centre. Two brand-new charging stations have been installed and each station has 8 charging tips.

Chowdhury speaks on Clubs Training. More than 50 clubs attended the various training sessions. Issues around events, programming, accessibility issues, the various club services offered, were highlighted. Also, in regards to DSA Support, DSA Council's and a DSA Training was hosted to prepare the new DSAs and strengthen the established DSAs for the year of programming. Creating avenues for support for the DSAs included logistical help and funding (over \$7000) to succession planning (elections).

Liu speaks on Rex's Den's New Look. It has re-vamped its look on its menu, website, and all social media platforms. It has an all-day Breakfast. Also, new games have been introduced such as pool tables, air hockey, and basketball. The updated menu highlights vegan and vegetarian options.

Chowdhury speaks on Sponsorships and collaborations. SCSU has contributed over \$10,000 in sponsorship to assist clubs in their initiatives, including ArtSideOut, IDSSA, TedxUTSC and LASA

Nehrin speaks on Appeals/Petitions. They heavily advertised the VPAUA's ability to help students write petitions, provide representation for meetings with faculty. They emphasized this as a resource for students

and partnered with AA&CC, Health and Wellness, and downtown legal Services to ensure students safety and access to recourse was maximized.

Campaigns and Advocacy

Arale speaks on International Student Exchange. The Government has allowed the combining of the Off-Campus Work Permit and the Study Permit, which allows full-time international students to work off-campus for a maximum of 20 hours per week during the academic year and 40 hours per week during the summer without a work permit. The amendments will also eliminate the requirement to wait six months upon commencing a degree before a student can obtain a work permit.

Arale further speaks on a campaign called We Ride: Greater Transit Accessibility, which took place by working with student unions all over the GTA. 2000 surveys have been collected so far regarding the understanding of students' needs for better transit. A Townhall was also held so students could learn more about the issue.

Arale speaks on Tuiton Fee Billing. Institutions will not be able to ask for tuition before early September. Students could then defer the second semester's payment to the beginning of January, when they receive their second OSAP installment.

Arale speaks on minimum wage, which has been frozen at \$10.25 for the past three years. The Liberal government has announced that they will raise it to 11\$ in June 2014, but that is still not enough and more work needs to be done.

Campaigns & Equity Commission

Nehrin speaks on Academic and Space Issues. Multipurpose space is now available in the IC-building. Issues around bell curves being endemic and disenfranchising for students in certain programs, discriminatory language courses, a new co-op policy, a revision of the No Credit policy, the need for multi-purpose space (prayer rooms, quiet space, etc.) and a need for better student-instructor relationships were among the concerns that also arose this year.

Events and Programming

Chowdhury speaks on the week of welcome. The year started off with Ignite Your Legacy, a yearly Orientation for the incoming first year students, which happened August 28-30th. Followed by a parade downtown on September 6th. Some staple events were the 4.0 fair, Fusion's 'sound-around' cart, the karaoke, the gym party, North Beach, and the Parade. In the Week of welcome, gave away free hotdogs, agendas and planners.

Khogali speaks on many events related to anti-racism discussion. Racialised Student Collective was a massive victory, as it created a very new space for racialised students to do anti-racist work at UTSC. Beaten By the Law was a conversation that opened up the work on this campus done on anti-black systemic racism in the legal system. Dis-Orientation was held throughout the month of September, including an event called Social Justice Block Party. It was followed by Let's Get Reel, in which different panelists spoke about how cultural appropriation plays out in the media.

The F-Word campaign was also launched. That's Why included cultural appropriation around campus. 'Think Pink' was a critique of the past event, and let students think about the Pink Washing aspect on the corporatization of Breast Cancer. National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence against Women

included the first ever vigil where students can check out messages of solidarity and action. The Vagina Monologues was a critique of this worldwide event. Topics that were touches on were Gender Based Violence, Rape Culture, Racialised Womyn Experience and dismantling sexism in all its intersectional forms.

Chowdhury speaks on Sustain-A-Week. A weeklong series of events in hopes of making people more environmentally conscious. Events included bike tour of the valley, tree planting, and lastly, held a campus clean up session where students went around and picked up garbage and cigarette buds.

Arale speaks on UTSC Mayoral Forum, which took place on February 5. It was the first mayoral candidate forum for the upcoming 2014 Toronto municipal election and took place at UTSC's Rex's Den. The candidates present included Rob Ford, David Soknacki, Robb Johannes, Al Gore, a former employee at Toronto Hydro; and Richard Underhill, a jazz musician. Topics included racial profiling of police, transit, world pride, and many more.

Nehrin speaks on Fall-Reading Week, which was a huge victory for students. UTSC is the only campus to have this so far

Chowdhury speaks on exam de-stressors, which was held in BV space. Over 500 kits were given out to students studying for their finals.

Chowdhury speaks on Nothing was the Same, Flawless, and Montreal Reading Week, which were all successful and received positive feedback. Gave away 8 awards to various clubs. Sankofa was an amazing cultural mosaic, which was sold out.

Feedback from students: overall, students were satisfied with their services. Except, some volunteers were not confident at the beginning of the clinic because they hadn't have experience doing tax clinic before, so suggested training them more next time before the clinic.

Also, about 100 students that were international students that came out to the session; overall expected a larger number.

Lastly, Paul thanks Liu for giving advice and support. Also thanks Arale, Chowdhury, Worku, and Nehrin, Khogali for their support.

Below is a list of motions followed by a brief explanation of carry or defeat on some of the more contentious. Many of these motions were amended at the meeting. Amendments will not be viewable until the next NGM report is released. However, motions were carried or defeated based on the spirit of those motions. 025 Motion to Amend ByLaws - DEFEATED

Amendments to by-laws are encouraged to be italicized as part of the CFS best practice.

043 Motion to Amend ByLaws - DEFEATED

N01 Motion - CARRIED with Amendments

N03 Motion - CARRIED with Amendments

Student money should be going towards fair initiatives. The Line 9 Pipeline affects our students, especially the exploitation of Indigenous and low income communities.

N04 Motion - CARRIED

N05 Motion - CARRIED with Amendments

N06 Motion - CARRIED

Administration uses different tactics to infringe on student autonomy. We are often put into situations because administration is not in favour of the work we do, and finds other, often illegal tactics to bypass our bureaucracy. This fund would ensure student unions are supported financially in legal defense cases.

N07 Motion - CARRIED

N08 Motion - CARRIED

N09 Motion to Adopt Policy - CARRIED

N10 Motion to Amend Policy - SENT to National Executive

Not a broad enough policy; does not address mental health. We have no current operational policy, but policy put forward needs to be revised.

N11 Motion to Amend Policy - DEFEATED

"Barriers" can refer to a number of barriers many folks face in society, such as access to post-secondary education or access to basic needs. Changing the name may take away from the purpose of the constituency, which is to provide space for folks with physical and mental disabilities.

N12 Motion to Adopt Policy - CARRIED

N13 Motion - CARRIED with Amendments

Motion was amended at the closing plenary (where final decision on all motions are made) by the Aboriginal Caucus. NWAC (referred to in the motion) no longer exists because funding is no longer provided, so motion needed amendments. Amendments included adoption of the Amnesty International campaign, and sponsorship of an Indigenous family to the Sisters in Spirit October 4th Vigil.

N14 Motion - DEFEATED

N15 Motion to Amend ByLaws - DEFEATED

The process to enter and leave the federation are two fundamentally different processes. Keep in mind the percentage is not the referendum number to certify or decertify, simply the percentage needed to initiate the vote.

N16 Motion to Amend ByLaws - DEFEATED

N17 Motion to Adopt Policy - CARRIED

N18 Motion - CARRIED with Amendments

Amendments included sending a letter to the Prime Minister, Minister of the Environment, and CEO of Enbridge condemning Line 9 and demanding environmental assessments.

N19 Motion - CARRIED with Amendments

Amendment to investigate new brokers and report to the next meeting, rather than choosing one for the next meeting.

N20 Motion to Adopt Policy - DEFEATED

Plenty discussion was had with folks in different constituencies/caucuses. An argument was made that we need a stronger stance to condemn aspects, but not the program itself as it is still a service that is useful for many folks. Overall, it was decided not to condemn the program.

N21 Motion to Amend Policy - DEFEATED

The Canadian Federation of Students does not support the marginalization or exploitation of any minority groups.

N22 Motion - CARRIED with amendments
