

EQUITY STATEMENT & ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF LAND.

1. EQUITY STATEMENT

As members of the Scarborough Campus Students' Union, mutual respect, cooperation and understanding are our goals. We shall neither condone nor tolerate behaviour that undermines the dignity or self-esteem of any individual or creates an intimidating, hostile or offensive environment. It is our collective responsibility to create a space that is inclusive and welcomes discussion. Any form of discrimination and harassment will not be tolerated. Hate speech rooted in, but not limited to, anti-Muslim, anti-Semitic, sexist, racist, classist, ableist, homophobic, or transphobic sentiments and/or remarks will also not be tolerated. We all have an obligation to ensure that an open and inclusive space, free of hate is established Any behaviour that does not demonstrate an understanding of these principles and/or creates an unsafe atmosphere will not be tolerated.

2. ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF LAND

We do a land acknowledgement as a means We do a land acknowledgment as a means of recognizing and centering the Indigenous land that the University of Toronto and, by association, SCSU occupies and operates on. For settlers, the act of performing a Land Acknowledgment is now a very familiar but still fundamental step towards highlighting the colonial context of the Indigenous ancestral lands where a gathering like this is taking place while also allowing space for our own individual reflections on our relationships between land and its peoples, realising that we all may be on different ancestral lands in this virtual context.

We'd like to acknowledge that we as a collective union operate from the traditional ancestral land of the treaty of the dish with one spoon, the Anishinaabe of which the Mississauga of Credit peoples are a part of, and the Haudenaasaanee, the people of this traditional ancestral land. Indigenous peoples have been here since time immemorial and this is still the home to many Indigenous peoples from across Turtle Island, and we are grateful to have the opportunity to coexist on this land. Settlers in Canada have directly benefited from the genocide and colonization of Indigenous peoples, including the robbing of their land and spiritual identification. In order to engage in resistance and solidarity against injustices inflicted on Indigenous peoples, it is imperative we constantly engage in acts of decolonization. In recognising the colonial violence still at work the SCSU commits towards the fight against systemic and institutional violence; with an end goal of complete liberation. This can only be achieved by including Indigenous people in our collective decision making for social justice and equity and working from an anti-colonial framework. I would also like to pay my respect to their elders past and present, and to any who may be here with us today, physically, mentally, emotionally, and spiritually.

Land Acknowledgements are just that, acknowledgements. Liberation has yet to come out of the hands of sole acknowledgements. We'd like to highlight some resources and initiatives currently active that folks can support in order to take their next steps in solidarity. PUT EQUITY IN ACADEMICS.

POLICY INTRODUCTION

CR/NCR EXTENSION

Vice President Academics and University Affairs has been working on advocating for the credit / no credit deadline to be extended to ensure that students are able to make informed decisions about their grades. A petition has been released for students to be able to sign to show support for this petition which has garnered hundreds of signatures already. In spaces with University administration VP Academics has been campaigning for the extension of the CR/NCR deadline as well as working with tri campus partners to ensure that this is made a priority for the University.

COURSE RELIEF POLICY

Vice President Academics and University Affairs has also been working on advocating for the course relief policy which enables eligible students who have changed their area / major of study to exclude courses that were completed towards their previous area of study from their cumulative GPA for their new program. Students can show support by signing the Course Relief petition which has been released and can be found across campus on SCSU poster boards, in the SCSU office or available when the Academic Support Centre is tabling. In space with University administration VP Academics has been lobbying for this policy to be offered to students at UTSC.

ACADEMIC ACCOMMODATIONS FOR STUDENTS EXPERIENCING INTERNATIONAL POLITICAL CONFLICT

Vice President Equity and President have been working alongside the EDIO to implement an academic accommodations policy for students experiencing international political conflict. Considering the various conflicts occurring around the world and the large racialized student population on campus, many students have been experiencing prolonged periods of distress that have inhibited their ability to perform well academically. This policy would thus provide impacted students with extensions on assignments, as well as other mental health resources. In conjunction with this academic policy, the Vice President Equity and President hope to work with the Registrar to instate financial relief for students experiencing international political conflict.

WEB OPTION FOR ALL COURSES WITH AN ATTENDANCE OF GREATER THAN 100 STUDENTS

Vice President Academics and University Affairs has been advocating for an increase in the courses offered for web-option in meeting with University administrators.

MANDATORY ANTI-OPPRESSION TRAINING AND SEXUAL VIOLENCE PREVENTION TRAINING FOR ALL STUDENTS, FACULTY & STAFF

The SCSU team has been advocating for mandatory anti-oppression training and sexual violence prevention training for all students, faculty and staff in meeting with University administrators. As for now the Sexual Violence Prevent and Support centre is the main point of contact for any training for UTSC community. The SCSU team will to advocate for mandatory anti-oppression and sexual violence training for all community members but especially faculty, staff and students.

MULTI-FAITH SPACES

Vice President Equity and President have been having continued conversations with the Chief Administrative Office to include Multi-faith and Multi-Purpose rooms in the new buildings. The SCSU has received confirmation from the Chief Administrative Office that space conversations to include Multi-purpose/faith needs are being met and considered within the new projects coming up at UTSC.

INCREASE NUMBER OF BLACK STUDENT ADVISORS (CURRENTLY ONLY ONE)

Vice President Equity and President have been having conversations with UTSC Health & Wellness to hire and increase the number of Black Student Advisors on campus. UTSC Health & Wellness has confirmed a strategy to increase Black Student Advisors here at UTSC.

PUT EQUITY IN ACADEMICS PETITION

With over 500 signatures, the petition is demanding the university to extend the CR/NCR deadline, to pass the Second Attempt for Credit Policy at the University Affairs Board, to include a Ramadan Accommodation policy, to bring back hybrid options for learning and finally to take away exam deferral fees. The petition demands have been brought up to the Dean of Academics and the Registrar's Office. The fight will never stop and students united will never be defeated. PETITION FOR PALESTINE

The Vice President Equity and President in collaboration with the Palestinian Cultural Club (PCC) and Muslim Students' Association (MSA), worked together to launch a petition in support of Palestine. Specifically, this petition demands the University to call for a ceasefire, recognize Palestinian genocide, and offer supports to students affected by the conflict. TRANSIT ADVOCACY.

UPASS AND POST-SECONDARY STUDENT FARES

On February 16th, the Vice President External released a U-Pass Petition to gather information and data on the percentage of student body that would benefit from a universal pass connecting them to all H-GTA transit systems via a subsidised fee. On March 8th, the SCSU executives met with the CAO and Student and Wellness Administrative team to discuss issues of transit within our campus and broader community. Alongside the VIce President Operations, we proposed short and long term goals to ameliorate the current transit conditions our students face. Upon receiving their support for our demands of increased 905 service, a shuttle bus connecting Kennedy Station to UTSC and the implementation of a Universal Pass, it was discussed that some of the data collection done via the Upass could serve to push for those initiatives once meetings with city councillors and other stakeholders are being conducted. TRANSIT AT UTSC

Our short-term and long-term visions for transit improvements around UTSC showcase a thoughtful approach to enhancing the overall commuting experience for students and staff.

SHORT-TERM VISION:

- Heated Shed by the Bus Loop: The addition of a heated shed near the bus loop is a practical and student-centric initiative, particularly during colder seasons. This amenity provides a comfortable waiting area, promoting the well-being and convenience of those using public transportation.
- Updated Fare Vending Machines: Modernizing fare vending machines is a crucial step in streamlining the boarding process and ensuring efficient user-friendly and up-to-date machines contribute to a smoother and more convenient transit experience for everyone.
- Pedestrian Scramble at Ellesmere and Military Trail: Introducing a pedestrian scramble at a busy intersection like Ellesmere and Military Trail enhances safety and accessibility for students. This measure not only promotes a safer crossing experience but also contributes to the overall efficiency of the transportation network.

LONG-TERM VISION:

- Increased Service on the 905 Bus Route: Advocating for increased service between UTSC and Kennedy Station through the 905 bus route reflects a commitment to meeting the growing transit needs of the community. This improvement ensures more frequent and reliable transportation options for students and staff.
- Direct Shuttle Bus from UTSC to Kennedy Station: The proposal for a direct shuttle bus from UTSC to Kennedy Station is a forward-thinking solution to reduce commute times to the downtown campus. This not only enhances the convenience for those travelling between campuses but also contributes to a more efficient transit network overall.

FIGHT THE FEES.

CANADIAN FEDERATION OF STUDENTS - NATIONAL DAY OF ACTION

The VP External has been collaborating with the Canadian Federation of Students to advocate for free and accessible education for all students. She is well-informed about the current education and tuition fee landscape in Ontario and is mobilising UTSC students to participate in the National Day of Action protest on November 8th, where students nationwide will be uniting to demand free and accessible education from government officials. These demands centre around increased public funding for post-secondary institutions and legislation to protect students' right to organise. Together with the VP of Academics and University Affairs, the VP External has been promoting academic amnesty to ensure students face no penalties for participating in the protest. The VP External has hired a student team of marketing and outreach leaders to implement a comprehensive strategy for informing and engaging students about the upcoming protest. This includes events such as poster-making workshops, a banner drop, an event breakdown/rundown, and breakfast programming on the day of the protest. TRI-CAMPUS SOLIDARITY.

SCSU has met regularly as part of the tri-campus solidarity group, UTEAU that unites student and labour unions across the three UofT Campuses.

CANADIAN FEDERATION OF STUDENTS.

NATIONAL GENERAL MEETING

The SCSU executives attended the National General Meeting held by the Canadian Federation of Students in November. Throughout the week, your SCSU executives attended constituency group meetings, Campaigns and Government Relations forums and panel discussions on racialized and 2SLGBTQ+ struggles. Your SCSU executives also participated in reviewing and voting on motions, as well as voting for upcoming Chairperson, Deputy Chair and Treasurer positions for the 2024 year.

CANADIAN FEDERATION OF STUDENTS - LOBBY WEEK

During the Ontario Canadian Federation of Students Lobby Week, the Vice President External, the President, the Vice President Equity, and the Vice President Academics and University Affairs, collaborated to present six recommendations to both Members of Parliament and Provincial Members of Parliament. These recommendations served as a strategic blueprint aimed at gradually reducing fees for all Ontario students until complete elimination is achieved.

The six recommendations include: Reduce tuition fees by 25% annually for the next 4 years, increase targeted grants to Indigenous student services, regulate international student tuition as a provisional measure towards eliminating tuition fees for International students entirely, increase funding of Ontario Disability Support Program for all people, Increase provincial funding to graduate students and finally, Implement legislation to protect students' rights to organise.

TTC RIDERS.

TORONTO BUDGET MEETING

On January 22nd, your Vice President External alongside your President, attended and spoke at the Toronto Budget Meeting for the region of Scarborough. Your two executives took the initiative to speak and address the demands of better transit infrastructures for UTSC students, as well as better financial access to that transit, hinting for the implementation of a U-Pass. With the presence of the Jamaal Myers, City councillor and Chair of the TTC, the Vice President External took the opportunity to speak on the unkept promise held by the city of Toronto to UTSC students in 2014, of which, in exchange for the funding of the Pan Am Sports Centre through tuition fees, UTSC was promised an Eglinton East Rapid Light Train connecting the campus to Kennedy Station. These concerns have been kept in record by two city councillors, including Jamaal Myers.

MP MEETING

The Vice President External joined conversations of Scarborough transit infrastructures with Member of Parliament Salma Zahid alongside TTC Riders. Topic of discussion mostly surrounded the need for new trains on the subway Line 2 as well as more frequent service on Line 2. The Vice President External took the initiative to discuss the Eglinton East Light Rapid Train with the MP, encouraging discussions about it within her constituency groups. SHUT IT DOWN FOR PALESTINE

The SCSU organised a Shut IT DOWN! For Palestine protest on November 29th. The protest was organised on behalf of a University Wide Student Walkout. The demands of the protest was to call on the university to recognize the ongoing Genocide and occupation being conducted in Palestine. CONSENT ACTION WEEK

The Vice President Equity and the Equity Centres Services Coordinator in conjunction with the WGSSA, led the SCSU's involvement in Consent Action Week programming. Specifically, the Vice President Equity led a Consent Action & Calligraphy workshop, and coordinated the SCSU's contribution to the Consent Action Week Survivors Protest.

POETRY FOR THE RESISTANCE

SCSU's ASC and RSC hosted an annual book club. This year students read selected works from Palestinian poets and authors - Mahamoud Darwish. BATTLE OF THE DSA'S

The Battle of DSA's is an opportunity where departmental student organisations table to sell goods, or services with the aim to raise awareness and promote their group's upcoming events and initiatives within the broader student community. BHM LAUNCH - BLACK HISTORY MONTH PROGRAMMING

The Takeoff was the SCSU's Black history month launch ceremony, organised and hosted by the Vice President External. The ceremony consisted of dance performances, prize giveaways, Black owned food vendors and Black student clubs for students to engage with. The launch took place on February 1st, 2024, at the Meeting Place from 1PM - 5PM. All students were welcomed to attend the festivities and indulge in free food and drinks provided by our local Black owned vendors. Students were also encouraged to interact with student clubs present with the incentive of entering a draw for our giveaway prizes. The purpose of the launch ceremony was to have UTSC students actively engage with Black led initiatives that occur both on and off campus and to demonstrate the panoply and diversity of Black culture, whether that be through food, dance, fashion, academia and much more. The Takeoff was a celebration of Blackness and an opportunity to share its vibrance to individuals who might not otherwise be exposed to it. It was also a space for Black students to be proud of their heritage, to be proud of their community and all of the wonderful creations that stem from Black minds.

HAIR CARE WORKSHOP - BLACK HISTORY MONTH PROGRAMMING

On February 7th, the Vice President External held a hair care workshop for black, female identifying students. Our collaboration with three expert facilitators from Urban Curls Salon brought the students of UTSC into the world of braiding and the intricate beauty of protective hairstyles found in various African and Caribbean cultures. Exploring different protective hairstyles, while indulging in complimentary snacks and refreshments, elevating the atmosphere of this engaging event. This event took place in the TV Lounge to encourage students to see their hard work via the built in mirror wall.

BHM COFFEE SHOP DATE - BLACK HISTORY MONTH PROGRAMMING

On the afternoon of February 14th, the Vice President External alongside the Racialized Student Collective planned a valentine's day event for black students on campus. The event took place at the 1265 Bistro and consisted of encouraging friendships and relationships building through prompts while indulging in coffee and pastries provided by Edill's CoffeeShop. The speed friending was led by two students, one of which being the racialized student collective coordinator. The participants were expected to converse with different students throughout the event to potentially gain new friends and mates and encourage healthy communicating skills to bring into existing and/or new relationships. To provide a coffee shop - like environment, we had two baristas set up at a bar to create fun coffee and tea concoctions and to provide pastries to our participants.

MONTREAL READING WEEK TRIP

SCSU executives hosted a reading week trip to Montreal from February 21st to 24th 2024. Touring downtown Montreal with Temple and Temple, students were able to interact with some of the touristic sites that the City has to offer. INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY EVENT: BRIDGING GENERATIONS: CELEBRATING MOTHER-DAUGHTER CONNECTIONS

On March 7th, the Vice President Equity hosted an event for International Women's Day celebrating mother-daughter connections, particularly those from immigrant families. Students had the opportunity to invite their mother or any other important female role model in their life to enjoy this event championing women, resulting in an attendance of 50. The event had a keynote address by Emma, the founder of Dear Mom, and fostered mother-daughter relations via vulnerable discussion, creating collaborative vision boards, painting, a photo booth, and more.

BUILDING SOLIDARITY MOVEMENTS: CONNECTING THE PALESTINIAN + TAMIL STRUGGLE

On March 14th, the Vice President Equity and President, in collaboration with the UofT Palestinian Cultural Club (PCC), UTSC Tamil Students' Union (TSU), the Palestinian Youth Movement (PYM), and the Tamil Freedom Coalition (TFC), hosted an event connecting the Tamil and Palestinian struggle for liberation. This event consisted of a keynote address from lawyer Fathima Cader, followed by a panel discussion with youth leaders from the UofT PCC, UTSC's TSU, the PYM, and the TFC. The 60+ attendees consisting of both UofT and external community members had the opportunity to have meaningful discussions on allyship and solidarity, share poetry, and enjoy Tamil and Palestinian food.

BLACK PROFESSIONALS NETWORKING EVENT - BLACK HISTORY MONTH PROGRAMMING

On March 11th, the Vice President External, Vice President Equity, and Events and Membership Engagement Coordinator hosted the SCSU's inaugural Black Professionals Networking Event. This event consisted of 30 Black students from UTSC and 30 Black professionals from various fields. Attendees had the opportunity to partake in various networking games, enjoy food, and build connections. Considering the diverse Black student population of UTSC, and the fact that networking events are often focused on the corporate sector, this event provided students attendees with the opportunity to meet professionals from interdisciplinary fields, positively influencing their professional development.

VIGIL FOR CONGO & 'LET'S TALK ABOUT CONGO'

On March 12th, the Vice President Equity and Equity Centres Services Coordinator collaborated with the Congolese Students' Association (CSA) and African Students' Association (ASA) to conduct programming for raising awareness on the ongoing genocide in the Democratic Republic of Congo. A vigil for Congo was held in front of the student centre, as well as a panel discussion titled "Let's Talk About Congo". This event involved a panel discussion with Prof Ahmed Ilmi and members from the CSA, followed by poetry reading, and an open art forum for students to paint or write poetry in recognition of and solidarity with the people of Congo experiencing violence and genocide.

WORLD WATER DAY

On March 21st and 22nd, the Vice President Equity, President, and Equity Centres Services Coordinator collaborated with Indigenous Initiatives to conduct programming in celebration of World Water Day. On March 21st, student attendees had the privilege to attend a teach-in led by Elder John of the Thunderbird Clan, Wikwemikong Unceded Indian Reserve, which included valuable teachings on the importance of water stewardship. On March 22nd, the Vice President Equity and President led a tabling event providing students the opportunity to create paintings and buttons for World Water Day.

CULTURE FEST

Throughout March 6th and March 18th to 22nd 2024 Vice President Campus Life and Vice President Operations executed Culture Fest, Culture Fest is SCSU's annual Multicultural Week Programming where UTSC Students and Groups can come together and display their culture through singing, dancing, a fashion walk, and of course, through food. This year we started our programming off with a Language Cafe which took place as part of our CoffeeHouse Programming. GROWING DEMAND

We continue to support almost 400 students on a weekly basis. Since we've seen a 260% increase in weekly sign up, we continue to operate two grocery pickup days. We continue to face challenges to our operations such as food procurement, volunteer support, and infrastructure. Our food centre coordinators are working tirelessly to meet these demands.

HYGIENE PRODUCTS GIVEAWAY

The Food Centre has continued to distribute hygiene products to students on a monthly basis. In addition to our partnership with Global Medic, the Food Centre purchases hygiene products from local stores on an ongoing basis to meet the growing needs of students on our campus.

COMMUNITY EVENTS

This past semester, the FC hosted two sustainability based events around tote bag decorating and button making in collaboration with Hart House. Tote Bags were distributed to ensure a sustainable solution for those picking up their groceries. The FC also hosted a make your own mug cake event for Valentine's Day, teaching students a creative way to make an at-home dessert!

FOOD SECURITY SUBCOMMITTEE

This semester, the FC attended meetings of the Food Security Subcommittee. The FC remains in talks with different departments on the topic of food security. One solution that arose from these meetings is a partnership with Harmony Commons Dining Hall who now donates hot meals, like soup, to the FC.

SOCIAL MEDIA

This past semester, the FC underwent a social media rebranding. Working with SCSU's Senior and Junior graphic designers, the new social media templates are now up and running on Instagram. Check them out!

ACADEMIC SUPPORT CENTER

One of many extensions of the Scarborough Campus Students Union (SCSU), the Academic Support Center (ASC) is a service centre that is focused on holistically supporting students in access to education. Building on the success of ASC's previous programming, ASC has extended our pillars to better serve and support students. This year, the Academic Support Center will serve students through our revamped pillars: Services, Programming, and Resources. In partnership with the RSC, the ASC also held its annual book club focusing on the work of Mahmoud Darwish. This semester, the ASC is seeking to host more creative writing workshops and LinkedIn photoshoots.

RACIALIZED STUDENTS' COLLECTIVE

The Racialized Students' Collective is an SCSU Equity Service Centre which seeks to be a safer space for Black and Indigenous students, as well as racialized students. Proudly championing the diversity of our UTSC community; the RSC exists to oppose racism, colonialism and all forms of oppression on and off campus, directed at our Racialized, Black and Indigenous students. Through our creative work of advocacy, services and collective allyship, we aim to continually reshape our campus culture that celebrates and honours our Racialised students. The RSC will be an open physical space reflecting the importance of racialized students and their identities taking up space in their University!

The RSC's mandate is centred around intersectionality and bridging gaps between different cultural groups. The RSC seeks to increase solidarity between racialized groups and seeks to increase awareness about the importance of closed spaces. The RSC also supported Black History Month programming with a haircare workshop, a speed friending event, and a gala. The RSC is looking forward to working on the Black Professionals Networking Event, in addition to a panel and vigil for Congo with the African Students' Association and the Congolese Students' Association.

VOLUNTEER NETWORK PROGRAM

With a look at more sustainable and forward thinking programs that the SCSU offers, we decided to revamp the VNP to create a volunteering structure with an internal shift. FINANCIAL SUPPORT.

ACADEMIC BURSARY

Now administered outside of the Financial Aid Office, the Academic Bursary was created by the Scarborough Campus Students' Union and is intended to support members that are dealing with financial hardship regarding their academic costs (e.g. textbooks, outstanding tuition fees, barriers to education). For other types of financial hardship (e.g. lost employment, need support accessing food or housing) the Emergency Grant form should be accessed. The move from the Financial Aid Office allows students to access their funds in a more accessible way, (e.g. via e-transfer) allowing for the bursary to be used for various costs as opposed to tuition on ACORN solely. EMERGENCY GRANT

Students who are eligible will be able to receive up to \$500 in emergency support. Application remains open until all available funds have been administered, or until the end of the Academic Year on April 30th when the Grant will reset. TRANSIT GRANT

With support from the Office of Student Experience and Wellbeing (OSEW), the SCSU launched the 2024 Transit Grant. EXECUTIVE REPORT

+UNIVERSITY AFFAIRS.

PRINCIPAL'S OFFICE.

Members of the Executive team meet monthly with the Principal, Dean of Students and Vice-Principal Academic & Dean to discuss ongoing lobbying efforts. In addition, on September 19th the Executive Team met with the Upper Executives to share our campaign priorities for the year. We are hoping to see a lot of student victories and we are especially excited for the return of SCSU's Accountability Forum happening in April, where students will again get to join in lobbying UTSC's senior executive team.

KENNEDY STATION - UTSC SHUTTLE BUS PROPOSAL

The proposed shuttle bus initiative aims to address the pressing transit challenges faced by the University of Toronto Scarborough (UTSC) community, particularly in light of campus expansions like the SAMIH facility and the retirement of Line 3. Currently, the existing transit routes connecting UTSC to subway lines result in long commute times, averaging between 1 hour 15 minutes and 1 hour 45 minutes for students travelling to the St. George campus. The impending need for transportation between UTSC and UTSC campuses due to new facilities further underscores the urgency of this initiative.

In the short term, the shuttle bus service will provide a much-needed solution to alleviate the burden of lengthy commutes for students. By offering direct transportation between UTSC and Kennedy Station, and potentially other strategic locations. The shuttle bus will significantly reduce travel times and enhance the overall commuting experience for the UTSC community. This immediate relief will improve accessibility and convenience for students, faculty, and staff.

Looking towards the long term, the shuttle bus proposal aligns with a broader vision of enhancing transit infrastructure in Scarborough. By prioritising safety, accessibility, and efficiency, the initiative seeks to create a seamless transit system tailored to the unique needs of UTSC. This includes exploring opportunities for route optimization, implementing advanced scheduling mechanisms, and integrating technological innovations to further streamline the commuting process. Ultimately, the shuttle bus service serves as a catalyst for fostering sustainable transportation solutions that benefit both the university community and the broader Scarborough region.

To realise this vision, the proposal seeks support and collaboration from the University of Toronto administration and TTC. Specifically, it calls for funding and logistical assistance to establish and maintain the shuttle bus service, as well as ongoing engagement with relevant stakeholders to ensure the initiative's success.
